Annual academic plan is designed taking into consideration the effective curriculum delivery and transaction. The general time table is prepared by the Time table Committee based on which the departments prepare the Time table for the academic year. The departments prepare their timetable and action plan according to academic calendar of the College. Departments discuss and plan teaching strategies for the effective implementation of curriculum. The Institution has internalized the practices of ensuring curriculum completion within the planned time frame. Extra classes are taken to complete the curriculum within the prescribed time frame. Seminars, Workshops and Extension lectures by subject experts are organized to supplement the curriculum transaction. Continuous evaluation and various competitions organized on the subject help in making sure that the curriculum has been transacted effectively Staff vacancies are filled on time for uninterrupted teaching learning process. The institution also organizes seminars and other training programmes to give better exposure to students and teachers.

Common exam time table is scheduled for internal exam of all UG Programmes. Internal exam for PG Programmes are conducted by respective course faculty. Any change in the conduct of internal exam will be informed to the students at least one week prior to the schedule. Type and date of Seminars and Assignments are the discretion of respective departments.

The Principal coordinates and controls the activities of the College with the support of the Vice Principal and College Council. The College Council assists the Principal in internal Coordination. All the academic and administrative activities of the College are first approved in College Council. The Departmental activities are coordinated by the Heads of the Departments and the activities of the various Committees, Forums and Cells are systematically planned and implemented by the coordinators. ### 7.2 – Best Practices

#### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Life Guidance Course Goal The objective of the Course is to equip the final year students to take up the responsibilities of an adult in the family, society and the nation. Context On completion of the Programme of study, the students emerge into the wide world outside where they have to take up the responsibilities of work, household and society. This transition from the carefree life of the student to the duty bound life of an adult is strenuous for majority of the students. Being a Women's College, a large section of the outgoing students gets married soon after the completion of the Programme. The students need to be made aware of their duty to the society and the nation. As

a College established in the pre independent era with the objective of empowering young women, the institution is very particular about imparting holistic education to the students. The basic unit of a society is the family, and women have a very important role in the prosperity and development of a family. Hence it is very essential to provide final year students, with awareness on the basic facts of marital life and the crucial role of women in the character formation of the children of the family. As the founder of the CMC congregation envisioned "When you educate a man you educate a single person but when you educate a woman you educate a whole society" The Practice Every year a Three Day Life Guidance Course is organized for the benefit of the final year students. Eminent psychologists and practicing marriage counsellors are

invited to speak and interact with the students on marriage, manwoman relationship, marital problems and social and national responsibilities of an adult Indian citizen. Sex education is also an important part of the programme. Students are offered a psychological approach to the study of human personality which helps them in understanding themselves and others. Training is imparted to foster the interpersonal skills which are essential at both the work place and the household. The duties of a citizen to the nation and the society are enumerated to inculcate in them social responsibility. The Life Guidance Course

offered by the institution gives the students an opportunity to equip themselves with the basic life skills needed for a successful life in society. This Course has been internalized and institutionalized and has been the Best practice of the College for more than 30 years. Evidence of Success Formal and Informal feedback obtained from the students and the alumnae point out to the great success of this Course. They have emphatically declared the relevance of this Course in their day to day life, at the work place and in the household. They have admitted that Course has a positive impact in helping them to have good interpersonal relationships. Many a time the alumnae have returned to the alma mater to acknowledge with gratitude, the practical use of this course in their marital lives. Educational Sponsorship Project Goal The objective of this Project is the holistic development of a specific number of school children

through an educational sponsorship promoting partnership of educational institutions. The Project aims at the development of these students into advanced learners with a potential for critical thinking and scientific temper. It also aims at enhancing of their IT and soft skills and empowering them with increased subject knowledge and life skills. Value education in provided to ensure that these students evolve into responsible citizens. The Context The current social scenario points to a marked increase in juvenile delinquency. A number of factors like nuclear families where both parents work, lack of value education, peer pressure, influence of media etc. have impacted negatively on young minds to produce this increase in crime rate. Realizing the importance of proper guidance and support in overcoming negative influences, the College decided to use its human resources to mould children of a young age. The Practice An MoU was signed by the Heads of St. Mary's College, Thrissur and St. Mary's Convent U.P. School, Chiyyaram. According to the agreement, forty deserving students with strong desire for knowledge and education without discrimination of caste and creed were selected from V to VII classes and the College adopted them under the sponsorship project. Financial support is provided to these students at the beginning of every academic year. In addition to this a one day orientation programme is organized every month for the holistic development of these students. The Departments take turns in organizing these activities and faculty and students of the College are actively involved. The forty students are also taken for a one day outing every year and brought to the College when exhibitions and fairs are conducted. Workshops and seminars are also organised. St. Mary's College, Thrissur to provide training to the teachers of the school so that they can support the

students to achieve the holistic development envisaged by the College. Evidence of Success The enthusiastic response of the students to the activities and programmes organised is evidence of the success of the project. A record of the academic performance of these students is maintained by the College and the students are performing better with each passing year.

In conformity to its motto the College has given top priority to discipline and has worked for the internalization of a culture of discipline in the lives of her students. To encourage diversity in our student profile, quota for students from backward communities, minorities etc. are filled according to the Government and University rules. Thus students with excellent academic credentials as well as first generation learners from disadvantaged sections of the society seek admission to the institution. Counselling is available in the campus to address problems related to stress, anxiety, examination phobia, peer pressure etc. The College has been in the forefront in its commitment to the society from the very beginning. The adoption of Nadathara Village and the setting up of a crèche and tailoring unit with assistance from the Kerala State Social Welfare Board, the Jubilee Memorial St. Mary's College Kudumbakshema Paddahati, CASP etc. are milestones in this area. The College continues with this tradition of service and has many community extension projects. St Mary's Square Outreach Sponsorship Programme which aims at the adoption and holistic development of 40 under privileged children of St Mary's Convent UP School Chiyyaram, The introduction of Bachelor of Social Work has provided an impetus to the community oriented activities and an MOU is being signed by the College with Kolazhy Panchayat by which the College will be adopting Kolazhy Panchayat and converting it to a Child Friendly Panchayat.
