For accounting requirement and to monitor financial activities, the

College uses Tally ERP Version 9. In order to maintain students' admission register, a software application, 'ECollege Solutions' from GJ InfoTech (P) Ltd., is utilized in the College campus. Student details like admission, class allotments, fee collection and TC issue are handled through this application. For communication amongst the students, parents, teachers and administration mobile based application, 'St. Mary's College, Thrissur - SMCT)' with the support of Dakota Technologies has been utilised. The application allows the Principal/Administrator to communicate any message to students, teachers or parents, upload event notifications, examination schedule, news etc. The Calendar facility allows the teachers to schedule their activities. The attendance registration in the App allows update student's period wise attendance. Parents are notified about the student's examination/results status etc. Faculty can also make request for leave through mobile based application 'St. Mary's College, Thrissur - SMCT)'. A separate module has been added to 'ECollege Solutions' for smooth conduct of university and internal examinations which includes room allotment seating arrangement and reporting of absentees.

### **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Principal in consultation with College Council and IQAC plans the activities for each year. Academic Calendar and Action Plan are prepared at the onset of the academic year based on the University Academic Calendar. Even though the curriculum is designed by the University, the College takes utmost care in delivering the curriculum in the most effective and systematic manner.

Annual academic plan is designed taking into consideration the effective curriculum delivery and transaction. The general time table is prepared by the Time table Committee based on which the departments prepare the Time table for the academic year. The departments prepare their timetable and action plan according to academic calendar of the College. The syllabus is divided among the faculty by the Head of the Department according to their respective areas of specialization. Departments discuss and plan teaching strategies for the effective implementation of curriculum. Monthly teaching plan is prepared to organize the teaching process. The Institution has internalized the practices of ensuring curriculum completion within the planned time frame. Extra classes

are taken to complete the curriculum within the prescribed time frame. Seminars, Workshops and Extension lectures by subject experts are organized to supplement the curriculum transaction. ICT enabled teaching and innovative teaching methods are effectively used to make the curriculum up-to-date. Students and faculty are motivated to attend MOOCs for updating themselves. Formal feed backs are obtained from all the stakeholders on different aspects of curriculum and its transaction and remedial measures are undertaken wherever necessary to ensure that the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved. Continuous evaluation and various competitions organized on the subject help in making sure that the curriculum has been transacted effectively The Management takes initiatives for uninterrupted execution of the teaching learning process. The integration of technology into the teaching-learning process is a priority of the institution. Staff vacancies are filled on time for uninterrupted teaching learning process. The institution also organizes seminars and other training programmes to give better exposure to students and teachers. A networking with faculty of colleges in the neighbourhood helps the faculty members to exchange ideas on the curriculum. All the syllabus who were left incomplete due to suspension of classes due to Covid 19 pandemic were completed using Google classroom, Google Meet and Zoom platforms in months of April and May.

Each class is under a class tutor. She / he is in charge of all activities with respect the class and is responsible for smooth functioning of each class. On every Friday, an hour is allotted as Tutorial Hour. During this time, Class tutor meets the students of the class, informs them of the common programmes and discusses various aspects pertaining to academic, co- curricular and extracurricular activities. Class tutor provides guidance to students gives directives and ensures that the activities of class run in a smooth and efficient manner. Class Tutor is also the adviser of the class who maintains close relationship with the students and parents. Any grievances of students are first informed to the class tutor. Class tutor works closely with other course faculty to do the best for the student community. Each student in the campus is assigned a mentor who supports and provides guidance for academic and personal issues. Principal in consultation with Head of the Department allots the mentors and Mentees and the list is published in the student notice board. Mentoring aims at relationship focused on supporting the growth and development of the mentee. The mentor may be from same discipline or other disciplines. Mentor maintains a close contact with mentee and meets them at regular intervals. Mentee who need continuous help are met with increased frequency. Mentors strives to bring out the best in the mentee. Mentor refers the mentee for professional help as and when needed. Mentors also contacts the parents of the students if needed.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Internal Assessment is conducted as per rules and regulations of University of Calicut. College has initiated a Internal assessment Policy for the conduct of Internal exams. Internal Assessment comprises of Attendance, Seminar, Assignment and test papers. Test papers are conducted in accordance with the academic calendar prepared by the College Council in the beginning of the academic year and on the basis of blueprint of the University year end exam. Common exam time table is scheduled for internal exam of all UG Programmes. Internal exam for PG Programmes are conducted by respective course faculty. Any change in the conduct of internal exam will be informed to the students at least one week prior to the schedule. Type and date of Seminars and Assignments are the discretion of respective departments. The Internal exam cell is responsible for the smooth conduct of the examination. In consultation with college council the Internal Examination cell sets the date for internal examinations. They are also responsible for preparing invigilation roasters, seating arrangements, invigilation duty, collection and distribution of question papers and answer sheets. Assignments and Projects are evaluated on the basis of predesigned Rubrics. In the current pandemic situation students were encouraged to submit assignment seminar in the online mode.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The University provides an academic calendar to the institution at the beginning of every academic year. It includes the number of working days, holidays, schedule of semester, examination schedule and so on, which is incorporated into the academic calendar of the College. College Academic calendar is prepared by the College Council .The Internal Exam Committee schedules the internal exams in tune with the academic calendar of the Institution. Re-scheduling of Internal assessment exams due to changes in the University end semester exams are discussed and approved in College Council. At

the Departmental level, The Head of the Department in consultation with the faculty chalks out a schedule of activities for the entire academic year. Curricular and Extracurricular programmes are scheduled in the beginning of the year on the basis of academic calendar.

The subsections include - Infrastructure augmentation, Maintenance, Infrastructure Extension, Class room allotment, Laboratory Use, Computers and Computer Lab, Library, Health Hub, Sports Land and Hostel Annual maintenance of all infrastructural facilities will be held every year during months of April and May. Request for infrastructure augmentation should be forwarded by College Council to the Education Committee. The work will be undertaken depending on availability of funds and Budget. The regular cleaning and the maintenance of the classrooms, laboratories and other infrastructure will be done as per schedule. Infrastructure is extended to the public for various programmes and extension activities with prior permission. College extends the facilities to SMART- Association of retired faculty and Elder Marian - the Alumnae Association for their meetings and for conducting extension activities. Students and faculty from neighbouring institutions can avail the facilities at the institution with prior sanction. Seminar halls, auditorium and common rooms are utilized for academic and extracurricular

activities. The request should be made in the Register maintained in the Principal's Office. Class rooms are allotted to different batches in accordance to the timetable. Any maintenance required should be informed to the Maintenance Committee through complaint register maintained at the enquiry. Timely maintenance of classrooms is ensured by support staff. HODs should ensure that the classes are maintained well and there is no damage to the functioning of electronic and electrical Equipments in the class. Laboratory rules and regulations are displayed at prominent places. The Computers are maintained and updated regularly by System Administrators. Softwares to prevent malwares are installed and updated. The ICT enabled class rooms are maintained and supervised periodically by Technical experts. Facility to utilize computers for learning and research is ensured in the computer lab subject to rules of the Computer labs and Browsing Centers. Students and Faculty can avail the facilities of health hub according to the time schedule and should strictly follow the rules and regulations. Canteen is open from 8.30am to 4.30 pm and the facility can be utilized by all staff and students. The rules of the Laboratories and Canteen should be adhered by all.

Best Practice 2019-20 Title of the Practice- Marian Monsoon Fest Goal The fest is conducted for raising funds for welfare of student community. It also aims for development of entrepreneurial skills among students The Context The College has large number of students from diverse backwards. Many students are really in need of financial support. Though College provides support in form of scholarships and free ships the need kept increasing. Considering this College IQAC decided to organise a fest to raise funds. After discussion with stakeholders it was finally decided to conduct Marian Monsoon Fest with participation of all stakeholders- Students, parents, Alumnae, and Staff. Practice Marian Monsoon Fest is initiated in 2014 as a Fest for Student Entrepreneurship and Welfare. Every year as the name signifies the fest is conducted in the months of July or August (during Monsoon). The entire college partakes in the activities in varying capacities. Students prepare themselves for the Fest weeks before to do their best. Self made ornaments, decors, embroidery items, processed food etc are the highlights of student entrepreneurship skills. The student entrepreneurs also take orders for stitching, doing embroidery, etc which they continue throughout their period of study. Students do take the opportunity of presenting their skills like mehandi designing , nail art, hair designing and so on. Food stalls and Vegetable sale are also run by Staff, alumnae and parents. Medical camps, educational fairs, film shows, personality development sessions are the other highlighted activities. Various College level and intercollegiate level competitions are organised to keep up the spirit of the Fest. All the proceeds of the fest are utilized for student welfare. The percentage share of amount obtained is allotted to students on basis of different heads. A sum is deposited each year and interest allotted to the students. The allocation is as follows- 30percent - scholarship, 30percent- medical assistance of students and parents, 20 percent for students to participate in sports and 20 percent for students to participate in D Zone and interzone competitions. Evidence of Success The increased participation of students is the evidence of success. Every year the good sum of money is collected for welfare activities and the increased participation of public is a good sign Problems Encountered and Resources Required There are many deserving students in the College and providing all of them with financial support is a difficult task. Organizing a Fest for 2 days alone will not be able to raise required funds. More programmes or year long programmes need to be initiated to raise funds. The Title of the Practice-Marian Centre for Advanced Research Goal To carry out scientific research with ethical considerations and creative ideas To bring forward science and research to address societal needs, education and service Take the research problems from the society and find solutions in the lab To carry out sponsored research projects, sponsored fellowships/ assistantships To promote the college-industry interaction by collaborations and MoUs. The Context The idea of a common research Centre under the banner of St. Mary's College was conceived during late 2017 and was materialized in 2018. The major objective of such research facility was to coordinate and conduct inter disciplinary research projects. Marian Centre for Advanced Research was thereby initiated. It works with its major objective, that of promoting science into day today life, bridging the gap between academia and society. MCAR emphasizes on the research activities focusing on the current issues in the field of life sciences. The centre is equipped with experienced faculty members specialized in various domains of biotechnology carrying out domain specific and multidisciplinary research. The areas of focus are computational biology, toxicology, Biochemistry,

Nanotechnology, plant biotechnology, Physiology and molecular biology. The division has unique facilities with respect to research activities and with the state-of-the-art laboratories. The research projects carried out are outcomebased, addressing the current challenges and problems faced by the society. At MCAR, we firmly believe that RD is a key ingredient in the all round development of students. Keeping this in mind, the college has been providing state of the art laboratories and instruments for the students to sharpen their research skills. The faculty constantly strives to inculcate a research oriented approach in students. This begins with the planning aspect of doing research and culminates in the successful completion of the research projects. The Practice Marian Centre for Advanced Research provides an excellent and colossal opportunity for aspirants in the field of science research. We support research community providing a platform to exchange their views and interact for a more productive futuristic development in their fields. MCAR-Research Support Services (RSS) provides students of our college and neighbouring institutions with personalized assistance and consultation throughout the complete cycle of their research efforts. RSS at MCAR helps our researchers navigate the breadth of internal and external resources to maximize our collective potential. We offer appropriate support for the Scientists, Researchers, Scholars and industrialists in their individual or institutional academic/scientific necessities. We host scientific events throughout the year by ourselves as well as in association with other scientific societies or institutions. MCAR -Internship Program offers students with research interest to get involved in internship in Plant Biotechnology, Pharmacology, Nanotechnology, Bioinformatics, Applied Microbiology and Silico drug development in our facility. MCAR has facilitated interns from all over India for two to twelve weeks period. MCAR initiative for development of sustainable agriculture products develops new low cost supplementary products for organic farming, such as enhanced compost, flowering enhancers and microbial bio fertilizer. The links established with other institutions enables transfer of technological skills and development of research aptitude in the participants and the extensive popularization of new products is a novel venture to enhance agricultural outputs. How ever our primary objective devoted to strengthen practical knowledge in academics and research cadres thereby bridging the gap between academics, industries and society. Evidence of Success Approximately 140 students have successfully completed their academic projects at MCAR. During 2019-2020 around 50 students did their academic projects in association with MCAR. In current academic year 2020-2021 70 students are doing their academic projects at MCAR. The bacterial based bio-fertilizer SMCNPK18 was developed and successfully distributed to 5000 farmers through Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Scheme. MECSMC11-Microbially treated compost that reduce the required water for the growth of a plant, GEMS14(Growth Enhancing Microbial Solution)- a flowering agent, to ensure economic viability by organic farming, VERMITOL advanced bio fertilizer developed using earth worm as an incubator for soil enriching bacteria are some of the other products developed through the venture. Problems Encountered and Resources required Currently the major problem encountered is the lack of research funding for advanced research.
